performed. All that takes place within us, around us, or through us, contains and conceals His divine action."

"If we wish to be united to God we should value all the operations of his grace, but we should cling only to the duties of the present moment."

6. Spiritual Practice as a mission outreach and an opportunity for personal growth

"Insanity: Doing the same thing over and over again and expecting different results", a quote that is attributed to Einstein.

Different times call for an adjusted mission.

In an attempt to reach that segment of the population called SBNR (Spiritual But Not Religious) we are trying some different things. Spiritual practices are being developed and then sent to the parish and the wider community. Its hoped that as Christians use these practices their faith and service will be enriched. For the wider community we pray that as the SBNR encounter them, they will be intrigued, their spiritual appetite awakened, and they may, in time become curious and search in the direction of the church.

The spiritual practices will connect with the readings for each week. The document that is circulated to the Christian community (through your email or by Australia Post) will be explicitly Christian. It will contain the gospel readings for the coming week.

The practice that is circulated to the community will not explicitly be Christian. We will however be clear where the practice is coming from (Anglican Parish of Kingscliff). We will also provide them with ways to connect to us by referring to our website, Facebook page,

email and phone number. This practice will be posted on community Facebook pages and on signs at each church.

This mission outreach is based upon the thinking that I believe the Holy Spirit is alive and prompting everybody. The problem is people aren't listening! These practices will be designed to kindle a listening heart and mind.

I encourage you to engage with these types of prayers.

I encourage you to pray for those in the wider community who will respond to the Spirit and use these prayer practices. Pray that lots and lots will use them. Love and Prayers
