Message from the Parish Priest

Finding the Wellspring: Cultivating Inner Peace in a Troubled World

Dear Sisters and brothers in Christ

In a world rife with conflict, anxiety, violence, and rumours of a 'Third World War', the search for peace can feel overwhelming. As we navigate daily challenges and witness global turmoil, our parish community is called not just to pray for peace, but to actively cultivate its source within ourselves. Two profound witnesses from the 20th century, Etty Hillesum and Thomas Merton, offer strikingly similar and deeply Christian insights into this inner journey.

Etty Hillesum, a young Dutch Jewish woman writing from the terrifying shadow of the Nazi occupation in Amsterdam, discovered an unshakeable sanctuary within. Amidst unimaginable external horror, she realized: "Ultimately, we have just one moral duty: to reclaim large areas of peace in ourselves, more and more peace, and to reflect it towards others. And the more peace there is in us, the more peace there will be in our troubled world." For Hillesum, peace wasn't the absence of conflict, but an active, internal "citadel" built through conscious attention, prayer, and radical acceptance of reality – even the most painful. She understood that true peace begins by tending to our own inner landscape.

Similarly, the Trappist monk and spiritual writer Thomas Merton, living through the anxieties of the Cold War and societal upheaval, pointed directly to the heart of inner peace. He taught that it arises from connecting with our deepest core, beyond ego and fear: "Peace demands the most heroic labour and the most difficult sacrifice. It demands greater heroism than war. It demands greater fidelity to the truth and a much more perfect purity of conscience." For Merton, this "labour" wasn't about passivity, but the active, often difficult, work of centering ourselves in God. He spoke of finding an "inner point of nothingness" which is simultaneously "a point of pure truth... the living heart of all reality... the pure glory of God in us." This inner stillness, grounded in God, becomes the wellspring of authentic peace.

What do these voices tell us, here and now?

- 1. Peace Starts Within: We cannot control the storms of the world, but we can cultivate an inner sanctuary. This isn't escapism; it's the foundation for effective action and authentic witness.
- 2. It Requires Conscious Effort: As Merton said, it's "heroic labour." It demands daily practice: prayer, meditation, examining our thoughts and reactions, consciously choosing love over fear, forgiveness over resentment. It means turning off the noise to listen for God's 'sound of sheer silence' (see 1 Kings 19:12).
- **3. It Flows Outward:** Hillesum reminds us that the peace we nurture must radiate outwards. An inner citadel of peace makes us channels of God's calm, compassion, and reconciliation in our families, workplaces, parish, and community. Our transformed presence is our contribution to world peace.
- **4. It's Grounded in God:** Both Hillesum and Merton found their centre not in themselves alone, but on God -the ground of our beseeching (Julian of Norwich). True, lasting peace is a gift received when we open ourselves to God's presence within the Holy Spirit "pure glory of God in us" and Christ's first gift to us after His resurrection (see John 20: 21).

This week, let us embrace the "heroic labour" of peace. Let us carve out moments of quiet to reclaim that "large area of peace" within, seeking the "inner point" where God dwells. Through prayer, Eucharist, the Sacraments, speaking out in defence of peace and human dignity, as well as supporting one another in this parish family, we can draw from that deep wellspring. As we strengthen our inner citadel, we become beacons of Christ's peace, reflecting His light into our troubled world, one heart, one act of kindness, one moment of calm at a time.

As Etty Hillesum wisely said, "When we come in contact with the other, we must do so with all the 'peace' we have collected in our solitude... We must be a balm for all wounds."

I wish you Christ's 'peace which passes all understanding', and I invite you to pray for, and to embody this peace both in words and actions.

Kingscliff Provides a Scrumptious Morning Tea for our Hope Walkers, and Pottsville BBQ Marks End of Hope Walk

Constantine and Dway lead a party of about 50 hardy souls on a walk from Tweed Heads through Kingscliff to Pottsville last Saturday, 21 June to raise funds to send a student from Hope Vale to a boarding school to obtain a secondary education. Education beyond Primary School is not available in Hope Vale, which is in far north Queensland just above Cooktown. Lindisfarne School visit to Hope Vale last Easter holiday raised a concern for the indigenous population and the lack of secondary education.

The 'Hope Walkers' included students from Lindisfarne, parents and parishioners. They braved the showery conditions and kept soldiering on to manage the walk in just over 6 hours, 40, 000 steps, and 38 kms (with a couple of stops).

Dway led the group of 33 'Hope Walkers' from St Cuthbert's to St James where he passed the baton to Constantine who led 21 people from Kingscliff to Pottsville. The 'Hope Walkers' were welcomed to St James for a break with a scrumptious morning tea provided by Marg Dephoff, Chris Parson, and Terry & Jenny McNellee. After a much needed break, the group set off from Kingscliff to the Pottsville community Garden and were welcomed by a very well set up BBQ organized by Brian and Jennie Wyver – thank you Brian and Jennie! The greaseless sausages and rissoles (supplied by our friendly local Pottsville butcher) on a piece of bread with lashings of tomato sauce were greatly appreciated. They warmed the damp souls even though they had sore soles! The bottled water assuaged thirst and were also greatly appreciated.


Parish Food Ministry


